Opening and Closing Pandora's Box

- 1. Having a right is not always the same as enjoying it. This is certainly true for highly mobile workers who consider the European market as their playing field.
- 2. A proper EU coordination instrument of social security law should provide legal certainty for all (kinds of) workers.
- 3. 'We cannot solve our problems with the same thinking we used when we created them' (Albert Einstein).
- 4. New forms and patterns of work offer new opportunities. In the search for a 21st century EU coordination instrument, let's think with an open mind and 'out of the (pandora's) box'.
- 5. Calculating behaviour has always existed and will continue to do so.
- 6. It takes courageous citizens to travel down unbeaten paths. Let us welcome them and let curiosity be our guide while assessing their cases.
- 7. When the European legislator fails to cope with high mobility there is a risk of legal fragmentation among highly mobile workers: those who 'fit in' the system of coordination and those who do not.
- 8. Not the European Court of Justice but the European legislature must be in the driver's seat as regards the coordination of social security for highly mobile workers.
- 9. If solutions were simple, rules and measures would not be that complex. It takes more than one brain to get it right.
- 10. The fact that the Netherlands did not endorse Beethoven's 9th Symphony as a European symbol must not be considered as a matter of being out of tune, but just demonstrates that the Dutch parliamentarians played an off-key note.
