- 1. Adjustment costs that are inherent to the changes in the skill composition of the labor employed in production contribute to efficiency loss. (Chapter 2)
- 2. High-skilled workers are more likely to be overcompensated in high-skilled intensive industries. (Chapter 2)
- 3. In countries where the labor market is more flexible, high-skilled workers are more likely to be overcompensated. (Chapter 2)
- 4. If the cost of inter-industry mobility is too high for both high- and low-skilled workers, the technologically changing industry can only develop by investing in education. (Chapter 3)
