

# A comparative study of legal developments concerning platforms in the EU, Us, and Korea

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## **Propositions**

- It is enough to roughly define the relevant market for multi-sided platforms based on the traditional tools since particular features of multi-sided platforms can be reflected at the stage of assessing market dominance and determining abuse of dominant position.
- Gatekeeper platforms have the same business model across borders; competition authorities around the world should therefore introduce various international cooperation measures to overcome information asymmetry in the digital market.
- In light of the changing market environment and the movement towards legislative actions targeting gatekeeper platforms, there are limits to controlling multi-sided platforms only by means of regulating abuse of dominant position.
- 4. I suggest a new three-phase model which competition authorities can apply in regulating multi-sided platforms. In other words, it is required to suggest applicable regulatory models that align with the characteristics and size of the platform at issue.
- 5. To keep consumers, regulators and politicians happy over the long term, there is no substitute for competition.
- 6. Lenience was activated in Korea through several revisions. Simply put, strict sanctions have been imposed on those who participate in cartels and fail to report, and there is a clear possibility of predicting what sanctions will be imposed in the case of reporting and non-reporting.
- 7. Laws are not created spontaneously through blueprints and raw materials, like objects are produced in a factory. It can be said that the law reflects all complex factors such as the history, culture, and natural environment of the society.
- 8. This research provides practical help to competition authorities in how to modify existing tools in examining abuse of market-dominant position by multi-sided platforms. In addition, the research will help policymakers in each country conduct legislative activities to promptly respond to sudden market changes occurring on multi-sided platforms.
- 9. Korean people often place significant importance on others' opinions. There is a prevailing tendency in Korea to look down upon individuals who haven't graduated from college. As a result, the college entrance rate in the country is nearly 70%, ranking it first among OECD countries.
