Biomarkers in cartilage repair and osteoarthritis

Mass spectrometry (imaging) for the detection of possible diagnostic and therapeutic biomarkers for cartilage repair and osteoarthritis development

- 1. The incidence of osteoarthritis in the younger population rises alarmingly due to an increase in obesity and intra-articular trauma such as (osteo)chondral defects, ligament tears or patella luxation (*this thesis*)
- 2. Most likely, a group of molecules (proteins, lipids, metabolites and possibly other molecules combined) will give a better insight in the development of osteoarthritis and possible therapeutic targets (*this thesis*)
- 3. The infrapatellar fat pad is not commonly studied in osteoarthritis research, where the focus is predominantly on synovial fluid, cartilage, or synovial membrane (*this thesis*)
- 4. Standardization of protocols for biopsy taking, sample preparation and mass spectrometry analysis is necessary to combine and compare datasets of biomarkers (*this thesis*)
