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# Propositions to accompany the dissertation

- 1. Most school-to-work transitions in the Netherlands end where they should, in work. (Chapter 2)
- 2. We only know if they end where they should if we observe them over time and long enough. (Chapter 2)
- 3. Long-term NEET status is a question of multiple risk factors, some of them are not easily addressed with policy changes. (Chapter 3)
- 4. Automation is a difficult concept to measure and its impact remains unclear. It is necessary to open the black box of occupation-level data with longitudinal task-based measurements to track changes in tasks within occupations. (Chapter 4)
- 5. NEET is also a question of family support. (Chapter 5)
- 6. Sequence analysis is a wonderful tool to explore data, but it risks cherry-picking of results. Data-driven decision guidelines might help, but what is needed are open-science guidelines on how to report findings.
- 7. The Dutch registry data are amazing and my home country of Germany should take note.
- 8. Sociologists overthink. Economists overcomplicate. Psychologists overmeasure.
